We strongly believe that by being immersed in the natural world, and experiencing vibrant ecosystems where all things thrive, that we become motivated to protect it.




Iberá Wetlands

Argentina's Iberá wetlands, situated in the northeastern point of the country, south of Brazil's Pantanal, is home to over 4,000 species of flora and fauna and over 30% of the country's biodiversity. Over the past 25 years, this once dissipated and heavily hunted marshland has been restored to a thriving biodiverse landscape where, on 1st January 2022, the first male adult jaguar roamed free in the wild in this region in over 70 years.

Founded by Kristine and the late Douglas
Tompkins (1943–2015), business leaders from
Patagonia, The North Face, and Esprit, the
team at Tompkins Conservation are working
to confront the twin crises facing life on Earth:
climate chaos and collapsing ecosystems. The
relentless restoration work by Kristine and Doug
Tompkins and their ambitious team at Iberá has
resulted in the restoration of almost 2 million
acres of protected land, the reintroduction of
over nine extirpated or endangered species, and
an ecosystem where wild nature is protected
and a regenerative economy is thriving.

This makes Iberá one of the greatest conservation success stories of all time.





Iberá Community

A fundamental pillar of the Tompkins founded NGO, Fundación Rewilding Argentina, was a commitment to restore the local community's connection with their environment, founded on the belief that a thriving ecosystem can have a monumental socio-economic impact.

Amongst the work that has been undertaken, programmes were initiated to involve and support the ten local communities, the Cooks of Iberá and the Artisans of Iberá, which have successfully generated local employment opportunities, and a strong sense of territorial pride, sustaining the culture and revitalising their livelihoods. This has been a direct result of the national park and the tourism it attracts.

SOFIA HEINONEN
Executive Director of Fundación Rewilding
Argentina

A lifelong activist, Sofía Heinonen led some of the first efforts to bring rewilding to South America more than 15 years ago with the restoration of the Iberá wetlands, the largest wetland ecosystem in Argentina. As a biologist and leader, she has spent more than 30 years designing strategies for the creation of protected areas in Argentina, and has an extensive knowledge of rewilding.

Lucila studied chemical engineering in Buenos Aires and environmental engineering in Madrid, where she worked as a consultant for a private forestry agency. In 2017 she started working at Rewilding Argentina, being one of the founders of the marine conservation program, with the goal of achieving the protection of at least 10% of the Argentine Sea. She has been the director of strategy and development at FRA since 2018, taking the projects on tour around the world.



SEBASTIÁN DI MARTINO Biologist & Conservation Director of Fundación Rewilding Argentina

Sebastián is a biologist with a Masters in Management of Natural Protected Areas — he has a genuine and deep passion for rewilding, which he has adopted as a way of life. He worked for 18 years as the technical director of protected areas in Neuquén Province.

He also worked for the Wildlife Conservation Society and was a consultant to the National Parks Administration. Since 2015, he has been the Conservation Director for Rewilding Argentina and is in charge of the reintroduction of species and environmental restoration that is carried out in Iberá.

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Buenos Aires | Day l

You will begin in the Argentine capital, Buenos Aires, a melting pot of art, music, food and dance. Spend the afternoon ambling the city streets, it's sidewalk cafes, stylish boutiques and characterful eateries. This evening you will meet your hosts and have a chance to connect with the rest of the group over a light dinner at Palacio Duhau.

STAY IN PALACIO DUHAU

On the most iconic avenue of the city's Recoleta district, the Palacio Duhau occupies a stunning neoclassical mansion of marble floors, crystal chandeliers and intricately carved 17th century oak panels.

Corrientes | Day 2

Today the adventure begins. Following a short charter flight to Corrientes, you will check in to boutique hotel, La Alondra. This afternoon, you will visit Estación Biológica Corrientes, designated as the quarantine where the animals are kept in transition before their release into the wild at Iberá National Park.

STAY IN LA ALONDRA

Dinner tonight will be at the hotel with your local hosts and Marisi López, the Iberá Project Coordinator.



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Iberá | Day 3

A short flight offers a birdseye view of these vast green wetlands as you travel to Rincón del Socorro Lodge, your homebase for the next three days. The lodge, carefully designed by Kristine's late husband Doug, is situated amid a private 60-hectare reserve in a tranquil spot in the heart of the Iberá wetlands.

Here you will meet with the Fundación Rewilding Argentina leadership team, Sofía Heinonen and Sebastián di Martino. The afternoon will be spent learning about the history of the region and speaking with the wildlife experts.

STAY IN RINCÓN DEL SOCORRO


Iberá | Days 4 – 5

Wake to the flurry of birdsong and sweeping views across the wild beauty of the ancient wetlands.

Days are spent wildlife tracking alongside the rangers in the company of red-and-green macaws, with visits to the small rural town of Colonia Carlos Pellegrini and a pioneering cattle ranch in sustainable farming. Explore the verdant wetlands by kayaking, horse riding, birdwatching and hiking through the pampas. As dusk draws in, enjoy a sundowner followed by a hearty asado, for fireside chats with fellow guests and the FRA team.

STAY IN RINCÓN DEL SOCORRO

Days are spent wildlife tracking alongside the rangers in the company of red-and-green macaws.





Island of San Alonso | Day 6

San Alonso Biological Centre is set on a 25,000 acre sandy bank in the heart of the estuary and Iberá National Park.

San Alonso was the first camp visited by Doug and Kristine Tompkins, and is now the heart of the rehabilitation project where biologists and scientists care for the wildlife, such as jaguars, giant otters, peccaries, anteaters, macaws and pampas deer. You will have unprecedented access to the inner workings of the rewilding programme. The afternoon will take place at the Jaguar Reintroduction Centre, for firsthand engagement with these extraordinary big cats.

STAY IN RINCÓN DEL SOCORRO

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
Carambola | Days 7 – 8

Depart the heart of the wilderness and arrive to El Tránsito, in the rural area of Carambola. The following days will be spent immersed in the rhythms and rituals of daily life, drinking mate with the gauchos and birdwatching with a characterful local guide. You will discover the remote 'isletas' on a traditional horse-drawn canoe, where typical houses are built between the grasses.

On the final morning you will travel by charter flight back to Buenos Aires where the journey ends.

The following days will be spent immersed in the rhythms and rituals of daily life, drinking maté with the gauchos and birdwatching with a characterful local guide.
